

Washington State Green Bank Announces First Project Investment Supporting Expanded Solar Installation at Pullman High School

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The Washington State Green Bank is announcing its first project investment, supporting an expanded solar installation at Pullman High School that will more than double the originally planned system size.

The project marks the first time Washington State Green Bank has deployed its own capital to support a clean energy project and represents an important milestone for the organization. Established in 2024, the Green Bank moved into a more operational phase in 2025 following the hiring of Executive Director Eli Lieberman, building the partnerships and financing tools needed to begin moving projects from concept to implementation.

Pullman High School was originally planning for a smaller rooftop solar installation through support from the Washington State University Community Solar Expansion Program. But because of the size and energy needs of the school, project partners saw an opportunity to make a much larger impact with additional solar capacity.

Expanding the project required additional financing, creating a challenge for the project team. As a newer developer, Zero Emissions Northwest faced barriers accessing the amount of capital needed to support a larger project. To help bridge that gap, the Washington State Green Bank provided credit support through a loan guarantee to Craft3, which was then able to offer additional financing that made the larger project possible.

Originally designed as a 131.8-kilowatt direct current rooftop solar system, the project will now expand to approximately 265.64 kilowatts, increasing solar generation capacity by more than 100 percent and creating a system more appropriately sized for the school's needs.

“This project demonstrates exactly why the Green Bank was created,” said Eli Lieberman, executive director of Washington State Green Bank. “Innovative financing partnerships can help unlock projects that otherwise might not happen while creating benefits for schools, communities, developers and the broader clean energy economy.”

“We, Zero Emissions Northwest and Partners for Rural Washington, are absolutely thrilled with the Green Bank’s support of our Giving Grid solar project atop Pullman High School as it will help create a significant and lasting impact for that school district & community.
